## Cracking the Code



A selection of queries received in the H.I.P.E. Unit recently:

**1. Question:** We had several patients admitted to our hospital with the winter vomiting bug (SRV - Small round Virus), and we weren't sure what code to use for this condition.

**Answer:**

Code to 008.64 Other small round viruses (SRVs).

**2. Question:**

A patient who was admitted for Lap & Dye for Infertility. What procedure code(s) would I use in this case.

**Answer:**

Two procedure codes are used to code this procedure. 54.21 Laparoscopy & 66.8 Insufflation of Fallopian Tube.

**3. Question:**

How do I code division of a TVT (transvaginal tape). The patient had the TVT inserted 8 months ago for stress incontinence, and is now complaining of urinary incontinence, urgency, frequency & recurrent urinary tract infections.

**Answer:**

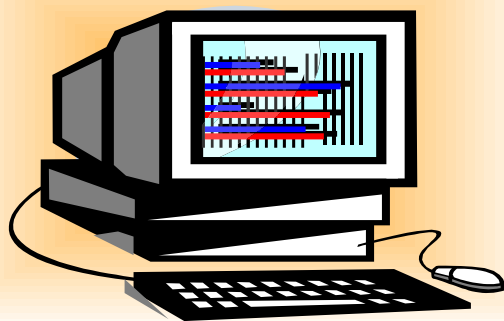
Code the division of a TVT to 59.79 Other operations on urinary tract. This is the same code that is used for the insertion of the TVT.

**4. Question:**

What code do I use for Myelodysplasia. The patient is 80 years of age.

**Answer:** Code to 238.7 Neoplasm of other lymphatic and haematopoietic tissues.

# Launch of the Report

## Activity in Acute Public Hospitals in Ireland 1990 -1999

by Minister for Health and Children

Mr. Micheál Martin T.D. March 26, 2002.



### **The Minister stated in his speech at the launch:**

“In many respects, the Hospital In-Patient Enquiry provides an example of health information at its best. It is a system which has been progressively developed over the years and has become an indispensable source of information on acute hospital activity particularly during the past decade.

The Health Strategy states that, "Information plays a central role in supporting strategic goals and in underpinning the principles of the Health Strategy. It must not be seen merely as an add-on". The implementation of the National Health Information Strategy will be critical in ensuring that information remains central and is appropriately resourced and developed. Acute hospital activity will quite obviously continue to be an essential part of that framework.”

### **Professor Miriam Wiley added:**

“This report presents the first comprehensive analysis of the *five and a half million discharges* treated by acute public hospitals in Ireland through the 1990's. Between 1990 and 1999 an increasing number of sicker people have been treated with shortening hospital stays within the acute hospital system. As close to 800,000 discharges were treated in 1999, this represents an increase of over 40 per cent in the number of discharges treated since 1990. Much of the increase in activity may be attributed to reductions in length of inpatient stays and in the expansion of day beds in hospitals which has resulted in increased use of day services. In 1999, one third of all discharges were treated on a day basis compared with just over one in ten discharges in 1990.” Professor Wiley went on to thank all who have worked in the past and who continue to work within the HIPE system both in the ESRI and all the coders and other staff involved in the hospitals.
